No. 1, BOUNDS AND PASSES—The following directions relating to Bounds, Passes and Church attendance supersede all other rules on these subjects; they refer to girls only.

The general principle is that Housemistresses and Housemstrons, working in collaboration, are responsible for the safety of the girls in their charge and are answerable to the Principal for their whereabouts. It is normally they who will issue passes, other than sleeping out passes, and regulate bounds; the Principal, if approached by any child or group of children, will not issue a pass but merely state that in the circumstances adduced he has no objection to a pass being given.

The following paragraphs relating to Bounds are intended to cover girls of Upper Fourth forms upwards but those of lower forms may be included at the discretion of the House Staff.

1. Short Bounds.

These can be used daily during games times by girls who are free.

Along the Short Back, by Jubilee gardens to the Pavement, by Chapel and the War Memorial to Nicholson House corner.

2. Long Bounds.

For use on Sunday mornings after church till 12-45; also, when permission is given, on mornings and afternoons of holidays till 5 o'clock. Down Donkey Slant to the Long Back, up Crater or along Lover's Hill but not below the road.

3. Roaming Bounds.

For use during holidays when special passes must be obtained. Pairs or groups of children are then allowed to go further afield but must inform their house staff of the direction they propose to take.

4. Cemetery.

The Cemetery is not to be visited except in the company of the Prefect or House Staff.

5. Kasauli.

Passes for shopping in Kasauli are to be given rarely; for the Cinema once a month only and then only when the film is a reasonable one.

Other Girls' Houses and Staff quarters are also out of bounds except on invitation but that does not apply to the Principal's House nor to the quarters of a girl's own Housemistress and Matron.

The Medical Officer's duty with regard to Indian employees, however, does not include the assignment of work or duties, hospital personnel and sweepers employed outside departments excepted. He is responsible to the Principal for their health, housing and general welfare; he also acts as a first court when there is a dispute between employees of two different departments, or when it is necessary to take disciplinary action against an Indian employee. He also acts for the Principal in cases involving misbehaviour among the private servants of Sanawar. Indian personnel are attached to various departments and the Head of this Department is responsible for assigning them their work and for seeing that it is properly carried out. When recruitment of a new man is necessary, the Head of the particular department should take the first steps in the matter and submit a recommendation to the Principal through the School Office; applications for leave, similarly, should be first investigated in departments and then sent on to the office on the proper leave form for ratification.

The School Secretary is responsible for all clerks, chowkidars and chuprassis wherever employed.

The Quartermaster for all workmen (except tailors) and storemen.

The Head Matron for all ayahs and sweepers in her department except those employed in the kitchen. The Head Matron G. S. is also responsible for all tailors.

Kitchen Matrons for all cooks, masalchis and sweepers employed in the kitchen.

The School Secretary is also responsible for Indian Servants quarters.

No. 292, FIRE ORDERS—The following orders for dealing with a fire in Sanawar are issued in supersession of School Orders Nos. 68 and 116 of 1938:—

- 1. When the Fire Alarm is sounded on a bugle, it concerns only the Fire Brigade; all other departments or dormitories will be roused by repeated whistle blasts or by repeated ringing of a bell.
- 2. The Fire Brigade is under the command of Serjeant Hare together with twelve boys. In the absence from the station of the Fire Brigade Commander, its charge devolves on the S. S. I. on duty. A nominal roll of the Fire Brigade will be posted on the B. D. notice-board and kept up to date.
- 3. On the Fire Alarm sounding, the Fire Brigade will at once double to the Quadrangle and fall in under the Fire Brigade Commander. If the Alarm sounds between Lights Out and Reveille, members of the Brigade will parade in sleeping suits, cardigans and running shoes. Practices at regular intervals will be carried out under the direction of the Chief Instructor who is responsible for the custody of the fire-fighting apparatus and for ensuring that every member of the Fire Brigade knows his duties.

The Fire Alarm will only be sounded under orders from the Principal, Medical Officer, School Secretary, Chief Instructor or the Fire Brigade Commander.

- 4. Should a fire break out in Birdwood School during School Hours, the Senior Master or Mistress present will have the School bell rung continuously; children will at once leave their form rooms under the direction of staff and in an orderly manner. They will fall in facing the School Building and await further orders. The same applies, with a few obvious changes, to an outbreak in Number 5.
- 5. An outbreak of fire must at once be reported to the nearest member of Staff or Prefect. If it occurs during the day and the building is an occupied one it must be immediately cleared of all occupants and the senior member present is responsible that the Fire Brigade is immediately informed.

The Mechanic incharge of the Power House must be notified of the particular quarter or building in which an outbreak of fire occurs. He will at once arrange for extra water pressure in that area and for the particular building to be disconnected from the electric mains.

If an outbreak of fire occurs at night in any building where school-children are sleeping, the senior matron or other adult in charge will immediately rouse all the occupants of the building by a vigorous ringing of a bell (Girls and Juniors) or blowing of a whistle (Boys). Children so roused are to put their sandals or shoes on their feet, put their top blanket round themselves and then fall in at a pre-arranged

spot well clear of the building. Section leaders (Seniors) or Matrons (Sparrowhawks and Juniors) are at once to count the children and see that they are all present; it is not enough merely to see that beds are empty, though this should be done also.

Some responsible person, Staff or Prefect, must be warned to take charge of the assembly while the person in charge of the building will go through every dormitory and bathroom to see that the place is all clear.

At the same time and as soon as the outbreak is detected some reliable individual should have been despatched to summon the Fire Brigade. (This applies to a real outbreak but not necessarily to practices.) A senior boy or girl should do for this duty and one such should be permanently appointed each year for each building *i. c.* one for each of Numbers 9, 10, 11, 12, 50, Holiday House, etc.

Two or three fire practices are to be carried out yearly; the person in charge of a building is also responsible for fire precautions there and for carrying out these practices. The first practice each year should be done in daylight but at least one a year is to be carried out at night.

- 6. The Medical Officer is responsible for fire precautions in the Hospital; in collaboration with the Nursing Sister he will ensure that two probationers are attached to each of the Boys, Girls and Infectious wards whose first duty, on an alarm of fire, will be to clear the wards, carrying bed patients where necessary. The first step, however, should be to send a message to the coolie lines and the second to notify the Principal. Two men from the staff of hospital servants should be instructed in the use of the Minimax.
- 7. The Quartermaster will draw up his own rules for dealing with an outbreak in Stores and for the salvage of Government property. The School Secretary will, likewise, draw up rules for dealing with an outbreak in the Office.
- 8. Should a fire break out in any Staff Quarter, a servant should be despatched with a brief written note to the Serjeant Instructor on duty who will assemble the Fire Brigade and deal with the out-break. At the same time, all school or private servants in the locality of the Quarter should attempt to put the fire out and salvage property. The Principal should be notified as soon as possible.
- 9. As soon as possible after term begins, the Chief Instructor will detail boys for the Fire Brigade while he and the Matrons in charge of buildings will explain carefully to their children what they are to do in ease of fire.
- 10. Every attempt must be made to salvage Government property but this must be done by employing school coolies and other labour marshalled for the purpose. In no circumstances, will children be employed on this work or allowed to enter a burning building.

The following rules regarding the censorship of telegrams and letters are published for information:—

POSTAL CENSORSHIP.

2. In view of the serious international situation the Government of India have decided to impose with immediate effect censorship on all classes of postal communications (including money-orders and parcels) between places in British India (including Indian States) and countries outside British India and the Indian States. In carrying out this censorship effectively it is the desire of Government to cause the minimum of delay to correspondence and of inconvenience to the public. The following instructions are, therefore, notified and it is requested that the public will carefully observe them in their own interest and co-operate with the officers of government who have to exercise this censorship:—

The name and address of the sender should be stated in full on the cover of every postal article.

Private correspondence should be conducted in English if possible. Letters should be clearly written and should be as brief as possible.

If English is not employed the name of the language used should be endorsed on the cover of the postal article.

Correspondence in any language other than English is liable to considerable delay.

The envelopes used should bear as few stamps as possible and should contain no lining paper nor empty sheets.

Further instructions will be issued from time to time by the Chief Censor, India, with regard to any special measures that may be imposed in connection with censorship.

TELEGRAPH CENSORSHIP.

3. Imposition of censorship—In view of the present crisis the Government of India has decided to impose censorship on all telegraphic communications transmitted between places in British India (including the Indian States) and countries outside British India and the Indian States.

Radio-telegraphy and Radio-telephony—All radio-telegraphy and radio-telephony services will be closed to the public until further notice. The radio-telegraphy service to Port Blair, and certain other services, will be re-opened as soon as possible.

Restriction on the form and language used in telegrams—in order to make the censorship of telegraphic communications, which is rendered necessary in the present emergency, as effective as possible, the public is earnestly invited to conform to the rules given below with regard to all telegrams intended for destinations outside British India, other than the Iudian States.

No abbreviated addresses should be used.

All telegrams should be signed with the name and address of the sender in full.

Telegrams should be written in plain English or French, and in no other language. If French is used, however, delay in transmission may occur.

Failure to comply with these rules may lead to the delay or return of the telegrams to the sender.
