





No. 455. BLACK-OUT—Special Ambala Area Order, No. 15, of the 23rd September, 1941 is published for information:—

- 1. During the forthcoming N. W. India Air Defence Exercise, i. e. from the night inclusive 7/8 October 1941 to inclusive the night 13/14 October 1941 the following regulations as to obscuration of lights will be observed in all cantonments in this Area.
- 2. No light shall be used in any building or part of a building or any premises appurtenant to such building or part unless it is so placed or is so screened by an opaque shade or by thick black or dark coloured material that no direct or reflected ray of light or glare emanating from it is visible from any angle outside the building.
- 3. No light whether intended for decoration, advertisement or any other purpose shall be exhibited on the outside of any building or construction or any plot of land.
 - 4. All Street lighting shall be extinguished.
- 5. No light brighter than that emanating from an ordinary oil lamp or candle lamp shall be carried or kept in any Street or open place, whether public or private.
- 6. No light brighter than that emanating from any oil lamp or candle lamp ordinarily used on carriages or carts shall be used on any vehicle unless such light has been so obscured as to diminish and diffuse it and make it ineapable of producing any beam.

Provided that lights used on Motor Vehicles shall be screened in the manner prescribed below:—

- (a) No light other than a white light shall be carried in front of a Motor Vehicle.
- (b) All lights capable of throwing a beam carried in front of a Motor Vehicle shall be screened in the following manner:—
 A single sheet of thin brown paper shall cover the whole of the glass and a second sheet of thin brown paper shall be superimposed over the top half of the glass.
- 7. All military vehicles will comply with the lighting restrictions laid down in I. A. O. 750 of 1940







2. During the forthcoming N. W. India Air Defence Exercise i. e. from the night inclusive 7/8 October 1941 to inclusive the night 13/14 October 1941 the following regulations as to obscuration of lights will be observed in all cantonments in this Area.

Part I.

- 3. No light shall be used in any building or part of a building or any premises appurtenant to such building or part unless it is so placed or is so screened by an opaque shade or by thick black or dark coloured material that no direct or reflected ray of light or glare emanating from it is visible from any angle outside the building.
- 4. No light whether intended for decoration, advertisement or any other purpose shall be exhibited on the ourside of any building or construction or any plot of land.
- 5. All public lighting in any street or any public place shall be extinguished.
- 6. No light brighter than that emanating from an ordinary oil lamp or candle shall be carried or kept in any street or open place, whether public or private.

- No vehicle shall be on a road between sunset and sunrise unless it complies with the provisions, appropriate to its case, of this order.
- 8. (a) A vehicle (other than a tricycle not propelled by mechanical power or a bicycle) shall have white paint, or other white material not less conspienous than white print, applied or fixed to the bumpers and running boards or shall have the paint or material applied or fixed in equivalent positions on the vehicle.

- (6) A tricycle not propelled by mechanical power or a bicycle shall have attached to or carried on the rear of the tricycle or bicycle, a white surface with an image of not less than 12 square inches so fixed that
 - (i) in the case of a tricycle, no part thereof projects more than 30 inches, and, in the case of a bicycle no part thereof projects more than 20 inches to the rear of any part of the surface;
 - (ii) not less than 6 square inches of the image are on the offside of the centre line of the bicycle or tricycle;

The white paint, white material or white surface shall be maintained in clean condition and unobscured.

Display of Lights.

- 9. Lights displayed for the guidance of traffic shall be subject to the following restrictions:—
- (a) Side lamps must not exceed 7 watts in power and must show a white light to the front only and must comply with the following conditions:—
 - (i) The reflector must be pointed with matt black or otherwise rendered ineffective;
 - (ii) Light must be omitted through a single aperture of a size not exceeding 3 square inches, the remainder completely opaque;
 - (iii) any top and side panels must be completely obscured;
 - (iv) the sperture in the front glass through which the light is shown must be obscured by inserting two sheets of newspaper or their equivalent, or by painting the glass so as to produce the same effect and
 - (v) the paper or paint must cover the whole of the aperture and must not be treated in any way which would increase its transparency.
- (b) Rear lamps must not exceed 7 watts in power, must show a red light to the rear only, and must otherwise be dimmed and screened in the same manner as side lamps. (It is not therefore permissible to illuminate the number-plate),


- (c) Stop lights must not exceed 7 watts in power, must show a red or amber light, and must otherwise be dimmed and screened in the same manner as a side lamp.
- (d) Head lamps must be so masked as to comply with the following requirements:—
 - (i) that no light reaches the ground within 10 feet of the lamp or within a distance, which is five times the height of the lamp from the ground if that is less than 10 feet;
 - (ii) that when the car is on a level road, no light is thrown above the horizontal;
 - (iii) that the mask has in it a screen of diffusing material;
 - (iv) that the intensity of the light on a vertical surface at a point 10 feet from the lamp does not exceed 2.5 foot candles; and
 - (v) that no light escapes except through the mask.

The condition as to brightness will be met if the wattage of the bulb used does not exceed 36 and a single sheet of brown paper covers the whole of the glass and a second sheet of brown paper is superimposed over the top half of the glass.

- (e) Dual purpose lamps, used by cars and motor cycles having combined side and head lamps, must be so masked that they comply with the requirements for head lamps, and also show light to the front through an aperture not exceeding three square feet, when the higher power bulb is turned on and not less than two candles per square feet, when the lower bulb is on.
- (f) Bicycle lamps and lamps which contain reflectors, or animal-drawn vehicles, must be screened and dimmed as follows:—
 - (i) the upper half of the front glass and the whole of any side of rear panels must be completely obscured; and
 - (ii) the lower half of the reflector must be painted with matt black paint of otherwise rendered ineffective.

Light may be allowed to escape through apertures provided for gentilation, so long as these are screened as far as practicable.

(g) Light from a direction indicator must be emitted only through an arrow shaped aperture, of which none of the three arms is of a width exceeding 1/8 inch, or through a single horizontal slit of a width not exceeding 1/8 inch.



Public Vehicles.

Police, fire and civil defence vehicles and ambulances may display dimly illuminated signs. The sign will normally be displayed from the unmasked headlamp but police and fire service vehicles and ambulances may use in addition to or in substitution for the headlamps signs any sign (provided it is dimmed and screened) normally used in peacetime.

If these vehicles have urgent work to perform which cannot be left until the raiders passed signal is received, they may use masked headlamps during the warning period.

While a vehicle is being used as a police, fire service or civil defence vehicle or as ambulance:-

- a light may be displayed in and for the purpose of a sign indicating the purpose for which the vehicle is being used.
- if the work in which the vehicle is engaged is urgent it may continue to display light from an authorised head lamp or an authorised dual purpose lamp in which the higher power is in use, notwithstanding that the person in charge of the vehicle has received an air raid warning.

Illuminated signs.

- 11. A light may be displayed in and for the purpose of an illuminated sign on a taximeter dab indicating that it is a taximeter cab plying for hire, so long as the light is incon-licuous at a distance of 100 ft.
- 12. All lights which switch on automatically in cars when the door is opens must be disconnected. Interior lights in cars are prohibited.
- 13. (a) The rear light of a public vehicle may be displayed from a lamp fixed so that its centre is higher than 3 feet 6 inches above ground level, so long as its centre is not higher than 10 feet above ground level; and
- A lamp carried on a public service vehicle shall not be deemed to be other than an authorised headlamp by reason, only that light reaches the ground at a point nearer than 10 feet from the lamp or five times the height of the bottom of the lamp above ground level whichever is less.

 - the lamps from which the lights are displayed are shaded so that no part of the bulb through which any light is allowed to pass can be seen from any point outside the vehicle.
 - the illumination produced at any point at ground level **(b)** outside the vehicle does not exceed 0.001 foot candles.
 - the illumination produced at any point at ground level outside the vehicles does not exceed 0.001 foot candles, and
 - the lights are extinguished immediately on the receipt by the person in charge of the vehicle of an air raid warning.

Lights may be displayed in and for the purposes of any route number, route list or destination panel at the front rear or side of a public servicevehicle, so long as the brightness of the panels is no more than sufficient for the inscription thereon to be just legible at a distance of 100 ft.

- 15. No person shall, during the hours of darkness lead, drive or conduct, or cause to be led, driven or conducted or may lead any animal other than :-
 - (a) a fowl, dog or cat; or
 - a horse or other animal which is being ridden or is drawing a vehicle, unless.
 - if the number of those animals is four or less, there is carried in front of the animal or animals a lamp showing a white light and so screened and dimmed that no light is thrown upwards and no appreciable illumination is thrown on the ground; or
 - if the number of these animals exceed four, there is carried both in front of and behind the animals, a lamp showing a white light and so screened and dimmed as aforesaid.

- 1. Cases have come to notice of Censorship being evaded by military personnel, either by making use of a private code or by arranging for letters to be delivered by the hand of a friend.
- 2. The effect of the use of such a code is generally that the recipient of a letter is put into possession of information to which he is not entitled and the communication of which, therefore, involves a breach of military security. Such an action may, although not so intended by the writer, endanger the safety of our troops, convoys, etc.
- 3. All ranks will be warned that such expedients, however innocent they may be in intention, constitute a serious breach of censorship and security regulations. Severe disciplinary action will be taken against any personnel found offending in this way in future.
- 4. This order will be repeated in formation and unit orders throughout India and those overseas forces which are under the command of His Excellency, the Commander-in-Chief in India.
 - 5. India Army Order 1428 current is hereby cancelled.
